I love the challenge

At our last meeting we had an excellent presentation on polymer clays. At the meeting before that, we learned about photographing our bowls. Other art forms/crafts which can be related to wood turning include pyrography, carving and painting. Let's talk about photography first. This is a huge field. Hundreds, maybe thousands of books have been written on the subject, dealing with every aspect, including both the esthetic and technical. There are books on composition, books on lighting, on advertising photography, photojournalism, landscape, still life, portraiture, and on and on. So, when we get together and discuss how to photograph a bowl, you have to know we are leaving out a fair amount. This is a huge field, folks.

Our lecture on polymer clays left me with the same feeling. There are internet newsgroups, lots of books, clubs, and competitions. We listened for an hour and a half, and learned a lot, but mostly, I learned that the subject is HUGE! Pyrography is like

that too. I have one book on the subject, and I can tell you, as if you didn't already know, there is a little more to it than picking up a hot wire and signing your name on the foot of a bowl. Those who attended Art Liestman's presentation recently at Bill Small's house saw some really nice pyrography done with talent, taste and skill.

We occasionally see bowls which are enhanced by carving. I think we would see it more often if it were easier to do. You don't just start carving! It's hard to do, and even harder to do well. Painting is another art form that occasionally shows up on bowls, but, it takes a long time to develop the ability to do it well.

Each one of these art fields is as demanding as wood turning. Are we a little cockey to think that we can adapt these other media to our own needs by just jumping in? I am not saying you shouldn't try. In fact, I see so many interesting possibilities in polymer clay that I do plan to delve into it. But, realistically, I can see three possible outcomes: 1.) I'll find it is harder to do and less fun than it appeared in the demo, and I'll fall on my face. 2.) I'll make limited use of it, because it gets so involved. 3.) (And this one's scary) I'll find it so fascinating and rewarding that I'll slide down the slippery slope. My Stubby will go unused while I explore an ever widening new area of art.

So many projects and so little time.
